Potential Funding Related to Route 2 Scenic Byway Designation

Federal

Scenic Byway Funding

Within the U.S. Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) leads The National Scenic Byways Program. The Program is a grassroots, collaborative effort established to help recognize, preserve and enhance selected roads throughout the United States. The Secretary of Transportation recognizes certain roads as America's Byways®—All-American Roads or National Scenic Byways—based on one or more archaeological, cultural, historic, natural, recreational and scenic intrinsic qualities.

The Secretary of Transportation makes grants to states and to Indian tribes to implement projects on scenic byways. Federally designated, state-designated, and tribally designated scenic byways are all equally eligible for these grants, with no order of priority. Up to \$43.5 million was authorized for the 2009 fiscal year. FHWA eligibility criteria favor large-scale, high-cost projects that provide strategic benefits to the byway and the byway traveler.

Projects submitted for consideration should benefit the byway traveler's experience, whether to help manage the intrinsic qualities that support the byway's designation, shape the byway's story, interpret the story for visitors, or improve visitor facilities along the byway.

There are eight categories of eligible project activities:

State and Tribal Programs
Corridor Management Plan
Safety Improvements
Byway Facilities
Access to Recreation
Resource Protection
Interpretive Information
Marketing Program

Applicants must first consult the State Byway Coordinator about eligibility questions and steps for submitting an application. State byway coordinators establish specific criteria and procedures for making eligibility decisions, prioritizing projects and submitting applications to the FHWA division office. Some state programs set application due dates that are earlier than those set by FHWA. Some programs also limit the amount of funding for which each applicant can apply.

National Scenic Byways Program funds are provided on a reimbursement basis. The maximum federal share is 80 percent. Private, local, Indian tribe and state funds may be used as the match share. Applications are available on the National Scenic Byway website at ww.bywaysonline.org. Applicant organizations must also be registered with Grants.gov. The details of this registration process can be found on the Grants.gov website at http://grants.gov/applicants/organization-registration.jsp.

Appendix E: Publications, Resources and Other Supporting Documents (cont.) Conservation Tax Incentive

In 2006, Congress passed a law amending 26 US Code 170(h) to expand tax incentives to landowners who choose to donate a conservation easement on their land to a land trust, government agency or publicly supported charity that will permanently protect important conservation land. The 2008 Farm Bill included a 2-year extension of the conservation tax incentives, which now apply to easements donated between January 1, 2006 and December 31, 2009. A conservation easement limits the uses of the land for current and future owners. It is an agreement between the donor and the land trust, agency or organization, and can allow for certain uses to continue (such as farming) but may limit other types of development (such as residential or commercial) in the future. Public access may or may not be granted. The incentive:

- Raises the deduction a donor can take for donating a conservation easement from 30 percent of his or her income in any year to 50 percent;
- Allows qualifying farmers and ranchers to deduct up to 100 percent of their income; and
- Extends the carry-forward period for a donor to take tax deductions for a voluntary conservation agreement from 5 to 15 years.

•

Appraisal of the land must be done by a qualifying appraiser and the land must meet certain conservation purposes to qualify. It is important to note that this incentive is due to expire at the end of 2009. The Land Trust Alliance, a national conservation organization, is working with other interested parties to make the changes permanent and provides additional up-to-date information on the conservation tax incentive on their website at www.lta.org/policy/tax-policy.

Federal Historic Tax Credits

Federal income tax credits are available for income-producing residential and commercial property owners for qualified historic restoration projects. An owner's personal residence is not eligible. Under the Federal Rehabilitation Tax Incentive Program, owners of a property that is listed on the National Register or is within a National Register Historic District may deduct 20 percent of the cost of a major restoration project on their taxes. Restoration must be significant, exceeding the greater of the adjusted basis of the buildings or \$5,000, and work can be phased over a five-year period when there are architect's drawings and specifications prepared for the work. Restoration work must follow the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. The program is administered through the Massachusetts Historical Commission (MHC). A 10 percent tax credit is available for buildings that are not listed in the National Register but were built before 1936.

CONNECTICUT RIVER (SEGMENT MA34-02)

Location: Route 10 bridge, Northfield, to Turners Falls Dam, Gill/Montague

Classification: Class B, Warm Water Fishery.

This segment is on the 2006 integrated List of Waters in "Category 5"- Waters Requiring a TMDL because of priority organics, flow alteration, and other habitat alterations (MassDEP 2007).

This segment of the Connecticul River (MA34-02) is entirely contained within the 22-mile Turners Falls Power Pool. Bank erosion caused by a complex interaction of multiple factors is a significant problem in this reach of the Connecticut River. In addition to flood flows, boat wakes, overland flow, and groundwater seeps, pool fluctuation resulting from operation of one of three hydroelectric generating facilities directly Impact the day-to-day hydrodynamics of the Turners Falls Power Pool. The Northfield Mountain Pumped Storage Project is located within this segment. The joint operation of the Turners Falls and the Northfield projects has affected the daily flow regime of the river in this pool, resulting in larger and quicker pool fluctuations then would neturally occur (Franklin Regional Council of Governments and Connecticut River Streambank Erosion Committee 1999).

The Northfield Mountain Pumped Storage Project is located about five miles upstream from the Tumers Falls dam. It consists of an upper reservoir and an underground pumping and generating plant, which uses reversible pump turbine units. The Project also relies on the Turners Falls Pool to serve as a lower reservoir. During periods of low electrical demand, the Northfield Mountain Pumped Storage Facility pumps water from the lower reservoir to the upper reservoir using the pump turbine generators. The water is then released during periods of high electrical demand, again through the pump turbine generators. In this way, the project is able to generate a maximum of 1,080 megawatts of electricity. The increase in dem height over time, from 163.9 feet in 1867 to 185.5 feet in 1970 (21.6 feet in 103 years), has significantly allored the hydrodynamics of the reach. The joint operation of the Turners Falls and the Northfield projects has also significantly changed the daily flow regime of the river in the Turners Falls. Pool, resulting in larger and quicker pool fluctuations. Typically, pool fluctuations may average as much as 3.5 feet per day, and much higher fluctuations (9-10.5 feet) may occur over the weekly cycle (Frenklin Regional Council of Governments and Connecticut River Streambank Erosion Committee 1999).

USE ASSESSMENT AQUATIC LIFE

Habitat/Flow

Three hydroelectric generating facilities directly impact the day-to-day hydrodynamics of the Turners Falls Power Pool: Vernon, VT, Turners Falls, and Northfield Mountain. The banks of the Connecticut River in the Turners Falls Pool section are offen twenty or more feel above the water level, and are characterized by slumping and mass wasting of huge sections of streambank. Trees and other riparian vegetation frequently fall and slide into the water (Franklin Regional Council of Governments and Connecticut River Streambank Erosion Committee 1999). Evidence of extreme erosion prompted the Franklin Regional Council of Governments to carry out a series of 319-funded bank stabilization projects implemented

between 1996 and 2007. These Connecticut River Watershed Restoration Projects included. Phase I (96-03/319); Phase II (00-04/319); and Phase III (03-07/319). Eroding sites in this segment of the Connecticut River were inventoried and promitized according to factors including severity of the problem and feasibility of stabilization, and selected for restoration via design and installation of bloongineared bank. Over 2,500 linear feet of eroded bank have been stabilized by these three projects using a variety of bloonginearing techniques.

Biology

The Silvio C. Conte National Fish and Wildlife Refuge has lad an effort to control Traps nations populations in the Connecticut River Watershoo. They have reported isolated patches of this non-native aquatic macrophyte in this segment of the Connecticut River along the shoreline upstream from Barton Cove near the end of Barton Cove Road and near the Turners Falls Rod and Gun club (Boetiner 2007).

Note: Three non-native species (Mynophyllum spicatum, Cabomba caroliniana, and Potamogaton crispus) have been observed on surveys and are known to occur in Barton Cove (MA DCR 2005), Impairments due to the presence of these non-native plant species are reported under segment MA34122. Barton Cove.

Toxicity

Ambient

Water was collected from the Connecticut River, approximately 400 yards upstream from the Northfield Mount Hermon School WWTP discharge, for use as dilution water in the facility's whole offluent toxicity tests. Between August 2000 and September 2007, survival of C. dubia exposed (48-hours) to the Connecticut River water has been > 95% (n=14). River water trainings are ranged from 28 to 52 mg/L (n=14).

Effluent

Whole effluent toxicity tests have been conducted on the Northfield Mount Hermon School treated effluent. Between August 2000 and September 2008, 13 valid tests were conducted using *C. dubia*. The LCs were all >100% effluent (n=13).

Chemistry - water

DWM conducted water quality sampling downstream from Fourmile Brook in Gill (Station 02A) on this segment of the Connecticut River between July and September 2003 (Appendix B and E). All measurements were indicative of good water quality conditions.

Chamistry- fish tissue:

The Connecticut River Fish Tissue Contaminant Study (2000) was a collaborative federal and multi-state project designed to provide a boseline of tissue contaminant data from several fish species and learn what threat eating these fish poses to other mammals, birds, and fish (Hellyer 2006). This study reached the following conclusions: mercury poses a risk to fish-eating wildlife, DDT homologs (chemical physical and biological breakdown products of the parent compound) pose a risk to fish-eating birds, coplanar PCBs pose a risk to fish-eating mammals and fish-eating birds, and dioxin constituted a risk to fish-eating wildlife.

This segment of the Connecticut River is assessed as support with an Alert Status for the Aquatic Life Use. This decision is based upon the good survival of test organisms in toxicity tests and the good water quality conditions. However, this use is identified with an Alert Status due to the regulated flow regime; severe bank erosion issues, the isolated presence of non-native plant species, and the risk that fish tissue-contaminants pose to fish-eating wildlife. At this time there is insufficient evidence of a negative impact to in-stream biola to result in the impairment of this use.

FISH CONSUMPTION

The following site specific fish consumption advisory is recommended by MA DPH for the mainstern Connecticut River:

"(All towns between Northfield and Longmasdow)... Children younger than 12 years, pregnant women, and nursing mothers should not eat any fish from the Connecticut River and the general public should not consume channel cattish, white cattish, American eet, or yellow perch because of elevated levels of PCB" (MA DPH 2007).

Because of the site-specific fish consumption advisory for the Connecticut River due to PCB contamination, the Fish Consumption Use is assessed as impaired.

PRIMARY AND SECONDARY CONTACT RECREATION AND AESTHETICS

DWM collected E. coli samples from left bank, right bank, and center stream of the Connecticut River downstream from Fourmile Brook in Gill (Station 02A) between April and November 2003 (Appendix B). The geometric mean of these samples was 20 cfu/100ml.

DWM personnel made field observations at Station 02A during the surveys conducted between July and September 2003. No objectionable deposits or water odors were recorded, but potten or dust blankets were noted as being present on the water surface on three occasions. Water clarity was noted as clear or slightly furbid at this station (MassDEP 2003).

The Primary and Secondary Contact Recreation and Aesthetics uses are assessed as support based upon the low bacteria counts and the lack of objectionable deposits, odors, or oils. However, these uses are identified with an Alert Status due to the turbid conditions, regulated flow regime and severe bank emsion issues identified in the upstream segment.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Didymosphenia geminata, otherwise known as Didymo or "rock snot", is considered an invasive algae and has been found in the Connecticut River in Vermont and New Hampshire. Intestation and nuisance blooms of Didymo can produce thick mats that blanket stream and river substrates, causing a loss of habitat for fish and other aquatic organisms. Didymo blooms can make fishing, swimming, or boating undesirable or impossible (MA DCR 2008). Although it is currently not known if Didymo will colonize and/or bloom in the Massachusetts section of the Connecticut River, every affort should be made to prevent the spread of this nuisance algae in the mainstem Connecticut River and its tributaries. MA DCR recommends the Check-Clean-Dry protocol be followed when exiting waters that may be infested with Didymo. Field determined that 20 percent of the bank length has been protected by rock armor. Field recommends using new approaches for subsequent bank stabilization work, as continued reliance on armoring could lead to increased erosion elsewhere (Field 2007).

Water quality testing, especially TSS and furbidity, should continue to be monitored to assess the impact of the severe bank erosion upon the Aquatic Life Use.

The First Light Hydro Generating Company NPDES permit should be reissued with appropriate limits and monitoring requirements. Special consideration should be given to best available cooling water intake structure technologies that minimize fish impingement and entrainment.

Continue to monitor for the presence of invasive non-native aquatic vegetation and determine the extent of the infestation. Prevent spreading of invasive aquatic plants. Once the extent of the problem is determined, and control practices are exercised, vigitant monitoring needs to be gracticed to guard against intestations in unaffected areas, including downstream from the site, and to ensure that managed areas stay in check. A key portion of the prevention program should be posting of boat access points with signs to educate and alert users to the problem and their responsibility to prevent spreading these species.

TOWN OF GILL ADA INVENTORY OF TOWN PUBLIC ACCESS LAND

The general public in Gill uses one town-owned property, the Gill Elementary School and adjoining nature area. A brief assessment of the site's resources follows. Since the 2005 OSRP, the Town Forest was established. To date, no plans have been put in place to

This inventory employed standards used by the Massachusetts Division of Conservation Services that are based on state and federal guidelines. The inventory was completed by Franklin Regional Council of Governments Planning Department staff experienced in assessing parks and playgrounds for their level of accessibility.

Gill Elementary School Playground and Adjoining Nature Area

The Town of Gill Elementary School is located east of Boyle Road, which runs north south. The school is perched on a hill with level parking on the north end of the school as well as directly in front of it. The land in back of the school slopes west towards the nature area, which straddles Ashuela Brook. The paved area north of the school contains two basketball nets. There is one handicapped parking space directly in front of the school. In back of the school, there is a large grass-covered hill that slopes to a level area, which contains a soccer field between two baseball diamonds. There is one large wooden play structure with wood chips as a playground surface. Surrounding this is uneven lawn. There are four small climbing and riding play structures nearby the large play structure. On the southern end of the playground at different points on the sloped lawn and on more level areas are a small swing set and several climbing structures. The nature area to the east contains paths through high grass. The nature area is inaccessible from the handicapped parking space in front of the school.

It is suggested that a path made with TR7, a stone dust material, be created from the paved handicapped parking space to a level area in front of the school. A handicapped-accessible picnic table could be constructed between the trees. An accessible play structure could also be developed there. When packed down, the TR7 material can provide an adequate surface for anyone with mobility challenges.

Gill Town Forest

The Gill Town Forest is located in the northwestern corner of town. The 162.5 acre parcel has frontage and access from Bascom, Hoe Shop, and Dole Roads, with a primary access point and informal, roughly graded parking area off of Hoe Shop Road. Dole Road is a paved road, and Bascom and Hoe Shop Roads are gravel.

The property is subject to a Conservation Restriction which is held by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. The site is primarily wooded, with hemlock, oak, and pine the dominant species. The Falls River forms the western boundary of the Town Forest. The northeastern corner of the property features Otter Pond, which is a glacial kettle hole pond,

as well as several impressive glacial eskers. There are several abandoned beaver ponds which add to the habitat diversity of the Town Forest, and provide ample breeding grounds for mosquitoes!

The property was donated to the Town in September 2009, and is under the control of the Town's Conservation Commission. A Town Forest Task Force has been established, and is charged with gathering input on desired and suggested uses for the property, drafting recreation and stewardship plans, establishing trails, marking boundaries, and seeking grants and other funds.

The Task Force has not yet discussed possible ADA uses for the property that would be allowed by and compatible with the Conservation Restriction.

SECTION 504 GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

This Grievance Procedure has been established to meet the requirements of the American with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA). It may be used by anyone who wishes to file a complaint alleging discrimination on the basis of disability in employment practices and policies, or in the provision of services, activities, programs, or benefits by the Town of Gill.

The complaint should be in writing and contain information about the alleged discrimination such as name, address, phone number of complainant and location, date and description of the problem. Complaint forms are available in the Selectboard Office, located on the mein floor of the Gill Town Hall. Alternative means of filing complaints, such as personal interviews or a tape recording of the complaint, will be available for persons with disabilities upon request.

The complaint should be submitted by the grievant and/or his/her designee as soon as possible but no later than sixty (60) calendar days after the alleged violation to:

Within lifteen (15) calendar days after receipt of the complaint, the above named ADA Coordinator, or her designee should she be unavailable, will meet with the complainant to discuss the complaint and possible resolutions. Within lifteen (15) calendar days after the meeting, the ADA Coordinator or designee will respond in writing and, where appropriate, in a format accessible to the complainant. The response will explain the position of the Town or Gill and, where possible, will offer options for substantive resolution of the complaint.

If the response by the ADA Coordinator or designee does not satisfactorily resolve the issue, the complainant and/or his/her designee may submit a written request for a hearing with the Selecthoard within seven (7) calendar days of the transmittal of the written response of the ADA Coordinator.

The hearing shall be held not later than fifteen (15) calendar days after the receipt of the request. The ADA Coordinator shall be advised of the hearing. The Selectboard shall issue a written decision to the complainant and other parties as appropriate no later than fifteen (15) calendar days after the hearing. If the vote of the Selectboard is not unanimous, a minority report may be included in the decision.

The Chair of the Selectboard will inform the complainant that he/she has the right to pursue the complaint with the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination on the courts at any time and shall provide the addresses and phone numbers of such agencies. All written complaints received by the ADA Coordinator, appeals to the Selectboard and responses, will be kept by the Town of Gill for a period of at least three years.
