In the absence of a full time administrator to write a proper article for the newsletter, I have been asked to write this to let you know about a few important issues.

**Crucial School Budget Meeting** We want to remind everyone of a critical meeting coming up on July 31st at 7 PM at the Turners Falls High School. This will be a regional meeting of both the towns of Gill and Montague and is open to all voters in both towns to vote on a budget for the Gill Montague Regional School District.

At Gill's first Town Meeting on May 7th, the town voted the omnibus budget for the operation of the town and the schools contingent on a \$300,000 Proposition 2 1/2 override. That override failed and at Town Meeting on June 11th, the town operating budget was reduced and we appropriated money for the Gill-Montague District based on the amount that was voted in Montague, even though that was not the amount requested by the School Committee. We voted the amount so that we would have the funds to pay the district at a rate of 1/12th of last years budget until a budget is approved and knowing that we would still be in an override situation. The process in the GMRSD is that the budget has now failed and that forces a regional meeting. Registered voters from the two towns will be asked to vote on a budget for the schools as presented by the School Committee. If the vote passes, the towns will be

obligated to pay the district their share, regardless of whether or not an override passes. The budget presently certified by the School Committee will require overrides in both towns. If the overrides are not successful, then the Towns will have to fund the school assessment by reducing the operating budgets of the towns. At this time, it appears that the override necessary in Gill amounts to about \$130,000 and if unsuccessful, we would have to find that money in the town budget. If the vote at the regional meeting fails, the school committee will go back and reduce their budget and present it to another regional meeting for another vote. This process will continue until the two towns finally pass a budget.

It is important that all registered voters in Gill attend this meeting.

Please stop in and welcome Tracy Rogers, the new Administrative Assistant to the Selectboard who started work on July 23rd. We were lucky to have a group of very talented and qualified applicants and feel that Tracy

will do a great job for us. Most recently, Tracy was the Legislative Aide to Rep. Steve Kulik and is very familiar with how small towns run and has good connections in Boston. Tracy lives in Northfield with her husband Kevin and two sons. We are looking forward to working with her and hope that you will all give her a warm welcome.

The Selectboard also has a new face. After 15 years Phil Maddern decided not to run for a sixth term and Nancy Griswold was elected in May. Nancy served on the Finance Committee for the past year, was also elected in May as a write-in candidate as Assessor. Nancy has held many appointed and elected positions throughout her career, she was on the Selectboard in Ashfield, served as an administrative assistant. Nancy brings some great experience to the Board and while Phil's shoes will be hard to fill, both Lee and Ann are pleased that she decided to run.

The entire Selectboard thanks Doreen Stevens for filling in while the Selectboard's office was in the transition period after Deb left and before Tracy started. She handled the job extremely well and was able to keep a level head throughout. Great job Doreen and Thanks!!!

### Main Road Update

The work on Main Road continues, and although the road is now open much of the time, it is still recommended to avoid travel on Main Road when possible. You can access to all the businesses on Main Road, just take the shortest route to them. With luck, and a late winter, the project may be done this construction season.

Some notable former members from the past ten years who have gone on to fire service careers include Captain Timothy Goodhind (Masloski), and Firefighter Chris Goodhind (Masloski) and Firefighter Casey Bergeron of the Longmeadow (MA) Fire Department. Robert Strahan, Deputy Chief of the Greenfield Fire Department and Janet Wholey, Greenfield's first female firefighter, also began their careers in Gill. Shaun Bush, District Forest Warden for the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation was once a Gill firefighter, as was Firefighter Frank Matuszczak of the Longmeadow Fire Department. #### First Gill DNA Evidence Solves Crime

The Gill Police Department has successfully used DNA evidence from a blood stain left at a riverside residence during a Breaking and Entering in 2005. The blood evidence was collected by this department and then submitted to the state police crime laboratory in Sudbury Massachusetts. Based on information from the victim, a possible person of interest was suspected of committing the crime. A comparison of the person of interest's DNA and the blood recovered at the crime scene proved a positive match.

Currently the case is being reviewed by the Northwestern District Attorney's Office for future prosecution. With the assistance of the state police crime laboratory crimes in Gill are often solved by forensic evidence which has been proven to be more reliable that eyewitnesses.

# Franklin County Solid Waste Management District

**Annual Hazardous Waste Collection Event** The Franklin County Solid Waste Management District is holding its annual hazardous waste collection for households and businesses on **Saturday, September 8th**, at the Montague Highway Garage and the Town of Orange Transfer Station.

The collection is free to residents of Bernardston, Buckland, Charlemont, Conway, Deerfield, Erving, Gill, Hawley, Heath, Montague, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Rowe, Shelburne, Sunderland, Warwick, Wendell, and Whately. Businesses must submit an inventory of their wastes and will be charged for disposal.

To participate at any of the sites, residents must pre-register by September 3rd. Registration forms will be available in local newspapers, at local town offices, and at most town transfer stations. Beginning in August, registrations may also be completed on-line at: http://www.franklincountywastedistrict.org/hazwasteday.html.

This annual collection provides residents an opportunity to dispose of hazardous items such as leftover oil-based paints, stains, thinners, household cleaners, pesticides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, fluorescent lamps, automobile batteries, and other household chemicals. ### New Program for Disposal of Latex Paint

The Franklin County Solid Waste District is offering a new product to assist District residents in disposing of latex (water-based) paint: latex paint hardener. State law prohibits the disposal of liquid waste with trash, so residents must dry out liquid latex paint before disposing of it. For \$1 per bag, residents can purchase enough paint hardener for one gallon of paint. Once the paint is hardened and dry, residents can put it in their trash or in a bulky waste container, if their town's transfer station has one. Latex paint is not hazardous and is not accepted at the District's annual or regional hazardous waste collections. To purchase a bag of paint hardener, call (413) 772-2438. MA Relay for the hearing impaired: 711 or 1-800-439-2370 (TTY/TDD) The District is an equal opportunity provider.

District residents are from the towns of Bernardston,

Buckland, Charlemont, Colrain, Conway, Deerfield, Erving, Gill, Hawley, Heath, Leyden, Montague, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Rowe, Shelburne, Sunderland, Warwick, Wendell, and Whately. Greenfield residents are not eligible for this program.

Remember to reduce: When purchasing paint, buy only the amount you will need.

Remember to reuse: If you have latex paint that is still usable, consider giving it away to neighbors, friends, schools, or nonprofit organizations. It may be usable as a primer if it is not the right final color. Try posting it on your local Freecycle list: http://freecycle.org.

## Gill Cemetery Commission

In addition to the Riverside Cemetery's decision to raise the price of their cemetery lots to \$400 as reported in the June Newsletter, the Gill Cemetery Commission voted on May 16, 2007 to increase the price of a cemetery lot in Center, North, and West Gill cemeteries from \$375 to \$400, effective July 1, 2007.
