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Town Hall News

Annual Town Meeting

This year's Annual Town Meeting will be held on Monday, May 5 at 6:30 PM at the Town Hall. We hope to see you there! Your thoughts and ideas, opinions, and votes are all important!

The Town Meeting will also be Ann Banash's final one as a member of Gill's Selectboard—a position she has held for nearly 21 years! And do not forget 10 years of service on the Finance Committee before that. We will take a moment during the meeting to pay tribute to Ann and to recognize her years of service and leadership.

In addition to the routine votes on Town and School budgets, there are several weightier matters to be decided this year. Voters will be asked to approve funds to install a new roof on the front half of the Public Safety Complex, which is the home of our Fire, Highway, and Police Departments. The existing membrane roof is more than 30 years old, and the frequency and severity of leaks has been increasing in the last few year. It is beyond its useful life and needs to be replaced.

The Gill-Montague Regional School Committee is asking Gill voters to establish a three-member "regional school district planning committee," which will work with similar committees from Montague and Erving to explore the possibility of Erving's becoming a member of our school district. Erving currently operates its own elementary school and pays tuition to send grades 7-12 to Gill-Montague.

The Board of Assessors is seeking permission to raise the income level at which our senior citizens can qualify for a \$500 exemption on their property taxes. Currently the income limit is \$13,000 for a single individual and \$15,000 for a married couple. It is proposed to raise these limits to \$15,000 and \$20,000 respectively. Recently the Assessors have had to deny exemptions to several seniors because Social Security increases had pushed their income above the limits.

Voters will be asked to establish an Other Post-Employment Benefits Liability Trust Fund as a form of savings account for the Town's future health care insurance expenses for future retirees. There will also be a vote to create an Energy Stabilization

Fund that will be used to pay off the loan for the boiler project at Gill Elementary and to fund other energy conservation projects.

Energy Commission

The Gill Energy Commission held a free Composting Made Easy workshop on Saturday, April 5, 10 AM-noon at the Gill Town Hall. Amy Donovan, Program Director at Franklin County Solid Waste District, taught a composting workshop. The 28 attendees learned how to convert vegetable kitchen waste and yard waste into rich soil all year long. Amy brought along plastic containers with holes drilled to be suitable homes for worm composting that can be nurtured in the basement all year long. After showing photos of some large composting facilities here in Western Mass, participants went across the street to construct the "Earth Machine" composter behind the Gill Tavern. Chris Pietras, co-owner of the tavern, contributed some soil, food scraps, and hay from his gardens as Amy layered it with dry leaves and kitchen vegetable scraps to demonstrate the technique. Gill residents who attended automatically received kitchen counter composting buckets. If you would like one, please go to the Town Hall while they last.


Let's make every day Earth Day!

The upcoming workshops scheduled in the Gill Energy Commission's 2014 series are:


Electrify your bicycle, with Peter Talmage on May 10, 9AM– Noon at the Gill Town Hall. The workshop is FREE. Transportation is a large part of everyone's budget. Riding your bike instead of keeping it in the garage will save lots of dollars. Of course Gill and Western MA have a lot of hills. This workshop will explain the different types of ways a bicycle can














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be converted to electric power as well as the costs and the sources of products. As part of the workshop a bike will be converted to demonstrate the technique.

No Till in Gill with Alden Booth at Alden's house in Gill on June 7, 9 AM–Noon. FREE—Save time, energy and water too! Leave your rototiller in the garage this year. How you use your garden this summer and "put it to bed" this fall enables you to be rototiller-free in the spring. By using a garden fork and the same beds and rows each year, you can have awesome soil that is so easy to plant in. Alden will demonstrate rotating compost piles, using a passive worm pile (earth's rototillers), and both direct seeding and transplanting seedlings into tillfree beds. Alden will also demonstrate his roof water collection and and gravity irrigation systems.

Gill Town Forest

Since the fall, the Gill Town Forest Task Force has been meeting on a regular basis. We have met with knowledgeable people in the field of land and forest conservation. Paul Cantanzaro is, a forestry extension service specialist of U. Mass, and Emily Boss is with the Franklin Land Trust. We have applied for and have been granted funds by the DCR to move forward with a Forest Stewardship Plan. We have invited Mary Wigmore of Wigmore Forest Resource Management as the forester to design the plan. Our primary goal, in the eloquent words of one of our members, is to: *Work with others in the community to preserve a quiet, semi-wild place for birds, animals, and passive public recreation at minimal cost to the town*. Jessie Prucnal, a senior forestry student at U. Mass, will be interning with Mary Wigmore and submitting designs for trail systems. 
READING THE FORESTED LANDSCAPE


with Tom Wessels May 8, 6 PM, Greenfield Community College—FREE



Allan D. Adie, Sr., was a long-time resident of the Town of Gill. Among his many contributions to the town, he was the guiding force behind the creation of the Gill Historical Commission, which came into being in 1983. In honor of Mr. Adie's vision and hours of dedication in preserving the history of Gill, the Gill Historical Commission proposes to name the town's collection the Allan D. Aide, Sr. Historical Commission. Since the historical collection belongs to the Town of Gill, a vote on naming it is required by the annual town meeting. The GHC has asked the Select Board to include the proposal as a warrant this May.

April FRIDAY 24 1868

Worked for **J.P. Morgan** framing . . . and Rafters Self one day \$2.50

Clesson 1 day \$1.00 Total: \$3.50 Old cow calved -

SUNDAY 26

Dwight Goodnough here went down to **L. Bartons** Carried **Emma** up to School (Powers Institute)

April MONDAY 27 1868

Worked to **J.F. Griswolds** and up to see Williams' Barn and commenced framing for his Barn

TUESDAY 28

Worked for **J.F. Griswold** framing Barn Sills 1 Day **Clesson** (his son) worked 1 day

May SATURDAY 2 1868

Rains – went over to **Griswolds** and by **J. Morgans** home and in afternoon went to Greenfield carried Box of Butter – left it at **Waits** to be sent to Boston. **Emma** came home on foot (from Bernardston to South Cross Road in Gill).

May SUNDAY 3 1868

At home all day Mrs. Stearns put cow in our pasture

THURSDAY 7

Worked for **J.F. Griswold** framing Posts and braces Boys plowed corn land – had **Clark's** horse

FRIDAY 8


Snowed in morning Worked for **J.F. Griswold** framing Barn Posts ³/₄ Day

Boys ploughing 2 hours – had **Clarks** horse **Emma's** school (Powers Institute) closed
