Town Hall News

Fall "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Collection

The Franklin County Solid Waste District is holding the fall "Clean Sweep" bulky waste collection on Saturday, October 18 from 9 AM to 12 noon. The three drop-off sites are: the Buckland Recreation Facility on Rt. 112 South, the Northfield Highway Garage on Caldwell Road, and the Whately Transfer Station on Christian Lane. Please note that this fall the Buckland collection is back at the Buckland Rec. Center (from the temporary location at Mohawk last spring).

District residents may bring a wide range of items that are typically difficult to get rid of such as tires, appliances, scrap metal, furniture, mattresses, carpeting, construction debris, computers, televisions, propane gas tanks, and other large items. Materials will be recycled whenever possible.

NEW! Clean, dry textiles, and books will be accepted for free recycling or reuse. Please do not put textiles in the trash as 95% of all textiles can be recycled or reused. Put textiles in a Salvation Army or Goodwill Drop Box or bring to this event. Textiles must be contained inside a sturdy plastic bag. DO include clothing that is torn, stained, with missing buttons or broken zippers as damaged textiles can be recycled into insulation. Acceptable items include CLEAN & DRY: mismatched socks, shoes, and gloves; all clothing and accessories including belts, ties, bras & purses; and clean and dry linens such as curtains, pillows, comforters, sheets, towels and stuffed animals in any condition (except moldy or wet!) Books can be of any condition except moldy or wet, and can be hardcover or paperback. No encyclopedias.

You do not need to pre-register for the collection. However, there are charges for disposal. Disposal fees, cash only, will be collected during check-in at each site. Businesses may participate. Wood Pellet Bag Recycling – FREE

The Franklin County Solid Waste Management District has been awarded a Massachusetts Community Innovation Challenge Grant and a grant from MassDEP to implement a recycling program for wood pellet bags.

For Gill residents, the collection point is the Greenfield Transfer Station at 86 Cumberland Road (off of Wisdom Way), during their normal hours.

Step #1: WOOD PELLET BAGS ONLY! Other plastic bags are not acceptable. We cannot accept feed bags, soil bags, pesticide bags, or stretch film. These will put a halt to our recycling program.

Step #2: All bags must be <u>dry</u>. Wet bags will cause the entire load to be rejected by the recycling company.

Step #3: Shake out all wood pellets before recycling. You can cut the bottom off the bag to release pellets. Wood pellets and plastic bag recycling do not mix. Empty your bags!

Ag Plastics Collection

The Franklin County Solid Waste Management District has received grant funding to conduct a recycling collection for agricultural plastic (bale wrap, silage cover, greenhouse film, maple tubing, drip tape). Permanent collection sites should be operational by December in Charlemont, Deerfield, Greenfield, and Wendell.

In the meantime, there will be a collection event on Monday, October 20, at the Greenfield Transfer Station, 11:30AM–1:30PM. You must enter through the back gate off Petty Plain Road to Cumberland Road. Petty Plain Road is off Wisdom Way near the Fairground's Main Gate. Go to the end of Cumberland Road and through the gate. Collection will be across from the main building.

Materials that are NOT acceptable: twine, netting, black plastic mulch, fumigation plastic, row cover, pots, and trays.

Please follow these directions to ensure we can recycle your plastic: **Step #1:** Shake it out, shake off gravel, sand, and loose dirt. Shake off organic material.

Step #2: Cut greenhouse film, maple tubing, and drip tape into 4' lengths so it will fit in the baler. Cut all taps and connectors off maple tubing.

Step #3: Keep your plastic dry.

You can deliver your plastic in sacks or loose, but we must be able to unload and handle it. For more information, contact Jan Ameen, Franklin County Solid Waste District, Greenfield, 413-772-2438.

Free Tick Testing

Autumn weather also brings a resurgence of creepy, crawly ticks in our woods, fields, and lawns. As reported in the June 21, 2014, issue of *The Recorder*, more than one-third of ticks collected in Franklin County this spring tested positive for Lyme disease. The UMASS Laboratory of Medical Zoology provides ticktesting services to help families and physicians identify and map the distribution of ticks and the many disease-causing pathogens they carry. The tick and pathogen identification service normally costs \$40 per tick, but because of a state grant, Gill residents can have this testing done for FREE (up to 100 ticks for the Town). Right to Farm—Annual Disclosure

In accordance with the Right to Farm bylaw adopted by the Town in January 2009, we remind our residents of the following:

"It is the policy of this community to conserve, protect and encourage the maintenance and improvement of agricultural land for the production of food and other agricultural products and for its natural and ecological value. This disclosure notification is to inform buyers or occupants that the property they are about to acquire or occupy is within a town where farming activities occur. Such farming activities may include but are not limited to activities that cause dust, noise, and odors. Buyers or occupants are also informed that property located within the town may be impacted by commercial agricultural operations."



Public Health

<u>All Ages Flu Clinic – Gill Elementary Cafeteria</u>

Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year. Annual flu vaccine is recommended for most persons over 6 months of age. Young children, older adults, pregnant women, and people with certain underlying illnesses are most vulnerable to complications from the flu.

<u>Wednesday, November 19 from 3:30-6:30PM</u>, flu vaccine will be available at no cost (insurances accepted if available but not required) at a public clinic held at the Gill Elementary School. This clinic is brought to the residents of Gill through the Board of Health's membership in Franklin Regional Council of Governments Cooperative Public Health Service and is being conducted for the third year in collaboration with the School. 


