COVID-19 Self-Test Kits and Face Masks

While supplies last, residents can get free COVID-19 Antigen Rapid Tests (iHealth brand) from the Town Hall. Although the Use By date on the box is 07/24/2022, the FDA has granted an extension to the shelf-life of these products to 01/24/2023.

Please only take as many test kits as you will responsibly use. And if you are exhibiting any COVID-19 symptoms, please contact the Town Hall to arrange for a contactless, outdoor pickup.

We also have three styles of disposable face masks available for free at the Town Hall. The tightest fitting is Aura 1870+, which is an N95 mask made by 3M. The loosest fitting is a TB-01 three-layer disposable protective mask (often called a "procedure mask") made by JCJZ. In between those two is a 4-ply non-medical N95 mask made by FFP2.

Sewer System Warning

Residences and business that are connected to the Riverside Sewer System are strongly reminded that toilets are not the place to dispose of t-shirts, rags, rope, toys, and any other household materials that are flushable. These items get tangled up in the two pumps at the Pump Station and cause the pump motors to overheat and even to burn out! Repairs due to inappropriate materials being flushed have cost users of the Riverside Sewer System nearly \$10,000 in the last 6 months, and are a chief reason why the sewer rate will need to increase again later this year.

Trash & Recycling Reminders

Casella Waste Management Systems, the company that does the curbside collection of Gill's trash and recyclables, reminds everyone to please have your items to the curb by 7:00 AM. Items that are not put out in time may not be collected until the following week. If there is a problem with your rubbish or recycling pickup, please call Casella directly at (800) 227-3552 as soon as possible.

SUMMER 2022 Issue

It is important to remember not everything can be recycled, even if you think it should. Do not put these items in your recycling bins: plastic bags and wrap, Styrofoam, ceramics, paint cans or spray paint cans, auto glass, light bulbs, motor oil jugs, containers larger than 2.5 gallons, plastic or ceramic dishes, vases, gardening pots, or syringes/sharps. Repeat offenders will receive a letter from the Town, and could even have collection services suspended.

Trash Stickers by Mail

If any resident wants to purchase trash stickers by mail, send a check payable to Town of Gill along with a self-addressed,





stamped envelope to Town Hall, 325 Main Road, Gill, MA 01354. Trash stickers are \$3 apiece. Please include a note or indicate on your check that you are purchasing trash stickers. Trash stickers continue to be available for in-person purchases at the following locations during their posted business hours: Town Hall, Upinngil, Spirit Shoppe, and The Mill.

Recycling Bins & Compost Pails

Recycling bins – the free ones – are now available at the Town Hall. There is a limit of one per household; additional bins can be purchased for \$5 each. Kitchen compost pails are also available free of charge at the Town Hall, with a limit of one per household.

Backyard Compost Bins Discounted Price

Are you looking to start backyard composting, or need a better bin for your compost pile? Backyard composting is easy and affordable. In fact, it may save you money in the long run by reducing the amount you pay to dispose of your trash. Yard wastes such as leaves and grass clippings can be used as well as food scraps.

The Town Hall currently has a supply of Earth Machine compost bins. The Earth Machine compost bin is rodent-resistant and has a capacity of 11 cubic feet. It has a sliding door at the bottom for removing compost and a locking lid. It is made from post-consumer recycled plastic. The Earth Machine is not bear-proof.

The Earth Machine compost bins are available to Gill residents for a discounted price of \$25 each (regularly \$55 each). Payment can be made by

cash or check payable to the Town of Gill.

Are you one of the many people who have moved to Gill during the past year? If so, welcome! Please be sure to sign up for the Town's CodeRED emergency notification service. We use this system to provide residents with time-sensitive general and emergency notifications for such things as town events, changes to the trash/recycling collection schedule, hazardous traffic or road conditions, detours, flooding, emergency shelters, or evacuation notices.

There is no deadline to sign up. If you haven't added your telephone numbers (landline and cell), text numbers, and email addresses, visit the Town's website, and click on the link for CodeRED. If you don't have access to the internet, or need assistance with signing up, call Ray at the Town Hall, 413-863-9347.

Also, if you are voting in the State Primary and are an unenrolled voter you must check Democrat or Republican to receive the correct ballot. If you do not wish to choose the Vote by Mail option, there will also be the opportunity to vote early in person at the Town Hall. Dates are listed below. Please follow all the instructions on the application and your ballot when you receive them. You may also vote in person on Election Day upstairs at the Town Hall, 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Mosquito Control

Once again the Town opted out of the state's mosquito spraying program and submitted an alternative management plan that has been approved. A reminder to residents of mosquito prevention tips:

- Dump out standing water near your home. Mosquitoes need water to breed but need only a half-inch of water to lay eggs.
- Keep mosquitoes outside use screens on your windows and doors.
- Use repellent like DEET. Essential oils like peppermint and eucalyptus in small dishes near where you are sitting outside can help.
- While most mosquito species are active just before dusk and through the night until dawn, you can be bitten at any time, day or night. The risk of mosquito bites and mosquitoborne illness lasts until the first hard, killing frost.
- Know that mosquitoes use tall grass, shrubs, bushes, and clutter as resting places.



Walk-in Wellness

The FRCOG public health nurses will be in Gill every 2nd Friday from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. at Stoughton Place Community Room; walk-in wellness hours are open to the entire community.

Healthy Food Access

One important topic in public health is healthy food access, or the ability to get healthy food, often around barriers like price, physical distance to stores, or a lack of nutrient-rich food. For many, the summer and fall growing seasons can bring higher access to healthy food because it is convenient to stop at a local farm stand. A map of local farm stands can be found on the website of nonprofit CISA (Community Involved in Sustaining Agriculture) — buylocalfood.org.

However, accessing local food can be difficult simply because fresh produce can be pricey. Massachusetts

developed a creative solution to increasing food access and helping strengthen local farms: the Healthy Incentives Program (HIP). The program works alongside SNAP benefits (formerly food stamp dollars). Anyone who is eligible for any amount of these benefits has at least an additional \$40 dollars a month (as an automatic refund) that can be used on produce and other food items without preservatives. HIP dollars are widely used year-round at farmers' markets and benefit local farmers. Only certain retailers accept HIP, so check out CISA's website buylocalfood.org for information on where to redeem HIP. Or, chat up your local farmer at the market!

Tick Tests

Subsidized tick tests are available to Gill residents. The town has secured funds to subsidize a limited number of tick tests. The subsidy does not cover the entire cost. Should you have a tick bite and capture the tick, you may get it tested through tickreport.com and the subsidy will automatically apply when you enter your Gill address/zip code.

A Tribute To Doug Edson

In 1989, the first commercial internet service providers surfaced, as well as the first written proposal for the World Wide Web and gasoline was \$.90 gallon. In February the Soviets left Afghanistan, and on May 15, 1989, Doug Edson was elected to the Gill Board of Health.

Doug has served the Gill Board of Health since first being elected in 1989. He was Chair of the Board of Health for twenty-seven years. As of Election Day, May 16, 2022, he will have served 33 Years and 2 Days, or 12,055 days.

By the end of his term he will have served parts of five decades. At the time of Doug's election the President was George H.W. Bush and the Governor was Michael Dukakis. During Doug's time on the Board of Health we have had six presidents, seven governors and one very consistent, knowledgeable member of



our community give of his time to serve Gill. The town is a better place for all of us because of Doug Edson and his love of community. His love of Gill is evident whenever you speak to him; he has done, and continues to do, much for the community on his own and through his business.

I personally served with Doug for twenty-seven years and continued to work with him this past year as the Gill Health Agent. Doug has been my mentor and I am, in no small part, doing the job he trained me for over our many years together.

It is not always easy to serve on a Board of Health, never mind serving on one and owning an excavating company in that same town. Doug has done just that for thirty-three years. To avoid conflict or even the look of conflict is not easy. Doug has done so by being completely above-board and transparent at all times. Many people don't know that Doug has had to turn down work multiple times because he was a member of the Board of Health.

Doug always worked to ensure all people were treated fairly. His personal ethics carried through in his work with the Board of Health, and he provided the guidance to the Board of Health along the way.

I thank Doug both personally and on behalf of the citizens of Gill for his service to this community. I take solace in the fact that while Doug may be leaving the Board of Health, he is not leaving Gill. He is only a phone call away; or, of course, you could simply stop and have a chat when you see him along the side of the road in his truck, taking care yet another business matter before he loses cell service once again.

Call Statistics


In fiscal year FY22, the Gill Fire Department responded to a total of 286 calls for service. Out of the total calls, 147 were emergency medical responses and 139 were fire-related incidents. Incidents included structure fires, fire alarm activations, downed
















electric lines, mutual aid to nearby communities, animal rescues, area searches, and public assistance. In addition to emergency responses, our members logged approximately 160 training hours each through weekly drills.

Annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day

Franklin County Solid Waste District is planning to hold the 2022 household hazardous waste collection on Saturday, September 24th at GCC's Main Campus and the Orange Transfer Station.

Residents and businesses must preregister by September 16th. Online pre-registration for the 2022 collection will begin in mid-August, at: <u>franklincountywastedistrict.org</u>. Mailin registration forms will be available in late August at town transfer stations and in local newspapers.

Participants will be assigned an appointment time to bring wastes to

the collection; an appointment time and instructions will be provided by mail after registration is processed.

The collection is free for residents of most of the District's 21 member towns. Businesses may participate but must pay for disposal costs. For business registration information, call (413) 772-2438.

This collection provides an opportunity to dispose of hazardous items that should not be put in the trash, such as leftover oil-based paints, stains, thinners, pesticides, herbicides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, household cleaners, and other household chemicals. A more complete list of acceptable items is at: franklincountywastedistrict.org.

Batteries and mercury-containing items such as fluorescent light bulbs, thermometers, and thermostats will not be accepted at this collection. These items, which may contain mercury or heavy metals, should never be put in trash or recycling. Handle carefully, bring them to a municipal transfer station or a Regional Hazardous Waste "Super Site" and hand to attendant. In addition, fluorescent light bulbs are accepted at Lowe's Stores (all types of fluorescents), and Home Depot (CFLs only).

This summer, Gill Elementary School saw the arrival of a new principal, Dr. Walter Huston. Dr. Huston shared a little bit about himself through this interview.


What experience do you bring to Gill Elementary School?
