WANTED: Town Animal Inspector

There is an opening in Gill for an Animal Inspector. Candidates should be reasonably experienced in the care and handling of domestic livestock animals, be generally experienced in their husbandry, and be knowledgeable in the handling and care of other domestic animals such as dogs and cats. Knowledge and experience with common "urban wildlife" such as raccoons, skunks and bats that expose domestic animals and come under the jurisdiction of the MA Division of Fisheries and Wildlife will prove beneficial in the collection of specimens for submission to the State Rabies Laboratory.

There are no scholastic, professional (ie: veterinarians) or farm experience requirements for the position of Animal Inspector. A generalized knowledge of domestic animals will prove very useful.

The primary duty of the Animal Inspector has recently become rabies control in the domestic animal population. Town Animal Inspectors are also responsible for barn inspections.

Sustainable Yards

This article was submitted by Charley Cormier, who is a Gill resident and 10th grade student at Fours Rivers Charter School. Charley wrote this as part of a school project about plants and the environment and ways to have a more sustainable yard.

Having a yard that is constantly being mowed is not environmentally sustainable, but there are many alternatives that could change that. One simple way to make the yard more sustainable is to reduce the amount being mowed by half.

One alternative for less grass being mowed is to just let it grow, which can help with biodiversity in a few ways. More plants would be allowed to grow in place of the grass and can provide a place for endangered animals like birds to live.

Another option is to plant more native trees, shrubs and perennials in places that have mowed grass, which also helps pollinators and other species. Native plants are also adapted to their local climates, which helps them survive through

out a variety of weather conditions. That usually means they don't need as much care. On the other hand, non-native species may not be able to survive through the weather in climates that are not their native habitats. Non-native plants may need more care.

Maintaining lawns takes about 3 trillion gallons of water, 2 billion gallons of gas, and 59 million pounds of pesticides every year, but that number can be reduced by changes in human behaviors.

Although there can sometimes be a societal pressure to have a well-maintained lawn, it would be better for the environment if residents choose to have more sustainable yards. Remember, being sustainable doesn't mean that all grass has to stop being mowed, but think about ways you might change your lawn-care practices, and consider leaving half of your yard for the butterflies and bees.

From the FRCOG Public Health

As summer weather bleeds into the fall months, the FRCOG public health teams want to remind you that it's important to continue taking precautions against mosquito and tick bites.

For mosquitoes, decrease breeding grounds by removing standing water after rainstorms. Mosquitoes are most active from dusk until dawn; during those hours, consider covering up arms and legs. Use an EPA-registered insect repellent, which as one of the following ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE), para-menthane-diol (PMD), or 2-undecanone.

The most important step to avoid tick-borne illness is to make a daily habit of checking yourself (and your children and your pets, if you have them), for ticks. Ticks often hitch a

ride after physical contact, so think like a tick and start checking feet, ankles, legs, groin, and then work your way up the torso, arms, neck, hairline and head. Read about more tick prevention steps on frcog.org/tick-safety.

Fall is for apples, pumpkins—and flu clinics! In past years, FRCOG has worked with local places, like Gill Elementary School, to host flu vaccine clinics. Clinic dates will be posted on the FRCOG website (<https://frcog.org/project/vaccine-information/>) as they become scheduled. [As they become approved and distributed, more information on COVID-19 vaccine boosters will be updated on that webpage, too.]

The CDC recommends that everyone aged 6 months and older receive a flu vaccine, as the flu vaccine is the best way to prevent the flu and its potentially serious complications. The CDC notes that “last [flu] season, people who were vaccinated against the flu were 40% - 70% less likely to be hospitalized because of flu illness or related complications.”

FRCOG public health nurses are in Gill every 2nd Friday from 10 am – noon at Stoughton Place Community Room; walk-in wellness hours are open to the entire community.
