From the Town Clerk's Office

The Town Clerk's office is looking forward to an active election year. The presidential primary will be held March 5; local elections on May 20th; state primaries are scheduled for September 3rd; and it all culminates with the presidential and state elections November 5. The town is always looking for election workers. If anyone is interested in working the elections please call the Town Clerk. This is a great way to contribute to our community and get to know your fellow "Gillbillies."

To register to vote you must be a U.S. citizen, a resident of Gill and at least 18 years old on or before the town meeting/election. You may register in person or by mail, postmarked no later than the final registration date.

Vote-by-Mail postcard applications have been sent out by the state to all registered voters. Please return them promptly if you want to Vote-by-Mail, and follow all instructions on the card to avoid rejection. Applications are also available on line at www.sec.state.ma.us, and at the Town Clerk's office.

Once you receive your ballots in the mail, please follow all instructions to avoid rejection of your ballot. Return your ballots as promptly as possible; all ballots must be returned to the Town Clerk's office by 8 PM on Election Day in order to be counted. (6 PM for Town Election)

Board of Health

Impacted by opioids? We want to hear from you!

On behalf of your Board of Health, you are invited to a virtual listening session on Monday, February 5th at 6:30 pm. The opioid listening session is a way for our families, friends and neighbors to voice their ideas on how to address the harms of the opioid crisis. Because opioid manufacturers and pharmacies are settling lawsuits, funds are available. While the majority of these funds are going to state-wide initiatives and programs, a smaller amount of money is going directly to Gill and other towns. Many of our lives have been touched by substance use disorders and no idea is too big or too small. People are able to provide anonymous feedback in two ways: providing written feedback into the registration form, or by attending the Zoom session and changing their name and turning their camera off. Improving Heart Health

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for men and women,

according to the CDC, killing about 1 in about every 4 people it affects. Our individual risk for heart disease comes from both our family history and our lifestyle.

Luckily, even small lifestyle changes made over time can lead to big improvements in heart health. Steps to improve heart health include: scheduling and maintaining routine medical care, exercising regularly, choosing healthy foods, limiting salt intake, and reducing or quitting smoking. Does some of this information sound similar? Our bodies are interconnected—so what's good for the heart can also be good for the lungs, brain, and other organs!

Heart attack is serious and can be deadly. If you see signs of heart attack, call 9-1-1 immediately. A heart attack may not be the dramatic movie scene of someone grabbing their chest. Here are some symptoms of heart attack:

- chest pain
- feeling weak/lightheaded or faint
- Pain in the jaw, neck or back
- Pain or discomfort in one or both arms or shoulders
- Shortness of breath

Signs can look different in men and women. Breaking out into a cold sweat, feeling like a rope is squeezing the chest, upper back pressure, and dizziness may be important-to-identify symptoms in women.

A new round of electricity rates and terms has begun for Gill and 15 other towns in the area through the Community Choice Power Supply Program. Rate changes will occur and be reflected in the February 2024 electric bill. Dynegy Energy Services is the Community Choice electricity supplier. Those who opt-in will continue to get their electric bills from Eversource with Dynegy listed under the "supplier services" section of the bill.


Anyone who has Eversource or Dynegy as their electricity supplier can choose to opt-in or opt-out of the Community Choice at any time, at no charge, by calling Dynegy at (866) 220-5696.

Gill Historical Commission

Gift-Giving

The Historical Commission (GHC) has two books that make thoughtful gifts for all occasions. Life Along the Connecticut River covers the Riverside part of Gill from geology and dinosaurs to building the French King Bridge in 1938. The second book spans life in Gill from 1860 to 1930 with Jennie Williams Bardwell's family letters, two 1870s diaries and many pictures. Both are available for a donation of \$50 each at the Town Hall and on the GHC website. Copies of The History of Gill, vol. 2 are available for \$10 each.

Historical Trivia: Civil War Tax Stamps

The popular mid-19th century photograph, known as carte de visite or CDV, usually has a stamp on it. These stamps date from 1864 to 1866. The Union used these tax stamps to raise revenue for the Civil War.

SAVE THE DATE - April 20

HELP GILL PRESERVE ITS HISTORY:

Talk with GHC about how you can become a member or help with a project. Volunteer time is flexible. For example, a volunteer is currently working one morning a week to scan old deeds and make an inventory of them. Another is helping with filing newspaper clippings.

FRENCH KING BRIDGE RAILING: GHC has several sections of railing from 1938 to preserve and display. Ideas are welcome.

GHC AND FACEBOOK: Remember to look at Gill's history on social media. The lead article changes monthly and the frequent Facebook entries inform and challenge your historic knowledge. Visit these sites often!

SEVERANCE HOUSE: GHC continues to encourage NMH to preserve and renovate 551 Main Road instead of demolishing it.

Grass Hill, later D. L. Moody's Mount Hermon, belonged to Northfield before Gill's founding in 1793. The center of Gill was not located until Grass Hill was part of Gill and its geographic center could be located with a common and meetinghouse.

By all accounts, the Severance family first farmed on Bennett's Meadow and Grass Hill, where Ebenezer Severance was killed by a Native attack. Undeterred, the Severance descendants farmed the area for subsequent generations.

The connection between Ebenezer and Charles Severance, who lived at



what is now 551 Main Road, follows:

Ebenezer (killed) 1673-1723 Ebenezer (his son) 1709-1791 Abner (son) 1744-1825 Obed (son) 1792-1869 Charles Severance (son) 1833-1911 Wife Sarah died 1904.

Children: Ida Purple Park, Adeline Louise Canning, Elizabeth Belle Bullard, and son Charles Severance

When Charles Sr. died he no longer lived at his Gill residence but with a daughter in Vernon

A number of years prior to the founding of Mount Hermon (1881), the farmhouse appears on the 1858 Gill map as the residence of Gill farmer Charles Severance. The federal censuses show Charles living there with his wife, widowed mother, and children for the decades before 1890. The 1870 records show that Gill assessed taxes on his house, barns, sheds, and animals. His widowed mother paid taxes on the land.

The structure may have had two barns on the western end. Perhaps they were constructed by local barn builder Gardner James Oakes from Bernardston, who built a barn on a neighboring Purple property and in 1894-5 was building the Old Stone Lodge on Main Road, Gill.

A newspaper reports that D. L. Moody knocked on Charles Severance's door in 1890 to inquire about buying the house and 20 acres for his Boys' School. After that conversation, Severance House and its land came into the ownership of Mr. Moody's School about when Memorial Chapel and Overtoun Hall were built up on Grass Hill.







Gill Complete Streets Prioritization Plan

Franklin Regional Council of Governments staff has been working with the Town of Gill to develop a Complete Streets Project Prioritization Plan. The goal is to identify projects to improve bicycle and pedestrian access throughout the town. Completion of a Prioritization Plan will make the Town of Gill eligible to apply for funding (up to \$500,000 in 5 years) to implement the projects identified in the plan through the MassDOT Complete Streets Funding Program. Examples of eligible projects include creating new or improving existing crosswalks, developing new sidewalks or bicycle paths, installing pedestrian crossing signals, improving bicycle safety/mobility with new bike lanes or wider shoulders, or installing bicycle parking.

FRCOG staff conducted field work in the fall and winter to evaluate existing conditions and identify potential areas for projects. Examples of top priority projects include a sidewalk connection from the Stoughton Place apartments down to The Mill gas/convenience store as well as pedestrian improvements in the village center by Town Hall. Other examples include adding pedestrian crossing to West Gill Road where disc golf players cross the street as well as safety improvements where Northfield Mount Hermon students cross Main Road to access the lower athletic fields. The FRCOG also gathered input about specific areas where improvements are needed through an online survey posted in the previous edition of this newsletter.
